



POLITE NOTICE

- Lambing is a sensitive time for our livestock and our current setup means you and your children will be able to get close to our animals.
- You will be visiting a working farm and we therefore respectfully ask that noise is kept to a minimum and children are kept close to you at all times
- The Ewes which have lambs can be very protective and spook & worry easily. Please stay calm and do not run

HEALTH & SAFETY GUIDELINES & HOW TO BE SAFE AROUND OUR ANIMALS

- Pregnant Ewes & Lambs carry bacteria such as Toxoplasma and Listeria which is incredibly dangerous for pregnant women and can cause miscarriage. We strongly advise that pregnant women do not attend Lambing Live
- Know that animals carry germs that can make people sick. Never Eat, drink or put things in your mouth in the animal areas
- Wash your hands with soap & water in the sink provided immediately after visiting the animal area. Hand sanitiser or similar products are not, by themselves, adequate protection against E-Coli.
- PLEASE WASH YOUR HANDS. Please ensure that your hands and those of your children are washed thoroughly before entering the Shop
- Use the foot baths where provided when entering and leaving our animal areas
- Please do not feed the animals unless a member of staff has given you permission to do so
- Please note our animals may bite
- Our Farm & Farm Shop is a No Smoking area
- There is no room for pushchairs in our Lambing Sheds. Young children will need to be carried

ON THE DAY

- Wear warm clothes and suitable footwear (wellies or walking boots/shoes)
- Please arrive 10 minutes before your allotted time slot to give you plenty of time to park
- Please go to the Farm Shop and book in with a member of staff as soon as you arrive
- The tour will begin with a short briefing
- The actual time spent walking around our sheep & lambs will be approx. 30 minutes
- It is unlikely you will see any Ewes giving birth. However if one is showing signs we will try our best to enable you to witness the birth
- There will be the opportunity to see the lambs which are a day or two old and we will be telling you all about this seasonal farming activity and way of life
